
Brooklyn to Austin / Photos of Revelation Larry Racioppo

When I started photographing in 1971, I had no idea what I was doing, but I really enjoyed it. I gradually realized that I felt sharper and more aware of everyday life in my South Brooklyn neighborhood when I had my camera with me.

As I began learning about the craft and art of photography, I was influenced by Robert Leverant's book Zen in the Art of Photography. "A camera is an extension of ourselves. An appendage to bring us closer to the universe." Looking at the small black and white prints I made in my storefront darkroom, I was surprised to see so many images depicting religious expression. I thought that I had moved on from my Italian-American Catholic upbringing, but there floating up to the surface was the proof of my ongoing interest in religion and working class life. I have continued working on these topics not only in Brooklyn but throughout NYC ever since.




Larry Racioppo, "Holy Sacred Baptist Church, Brooklyn" 1998




